LOCUST HILL SOLICITOR POLICY: We have recently noticed a few solicitors coming door-to-door in our community. Locust Hill has a strict **No Soliciting** policy to keep our residents safe and secure. If someone knocks on your door trying to sell something:

- 1) Do not open your door to strangers.
- 2) Politely tell them through the door or video doorbell that soliciting is not allowed here and they must leave the community.
- 3) Afterward, please contact the Police Department at **609-581-4000** to report the incident.
- 4) **Do Not** call 911 as this is not a true emergency.

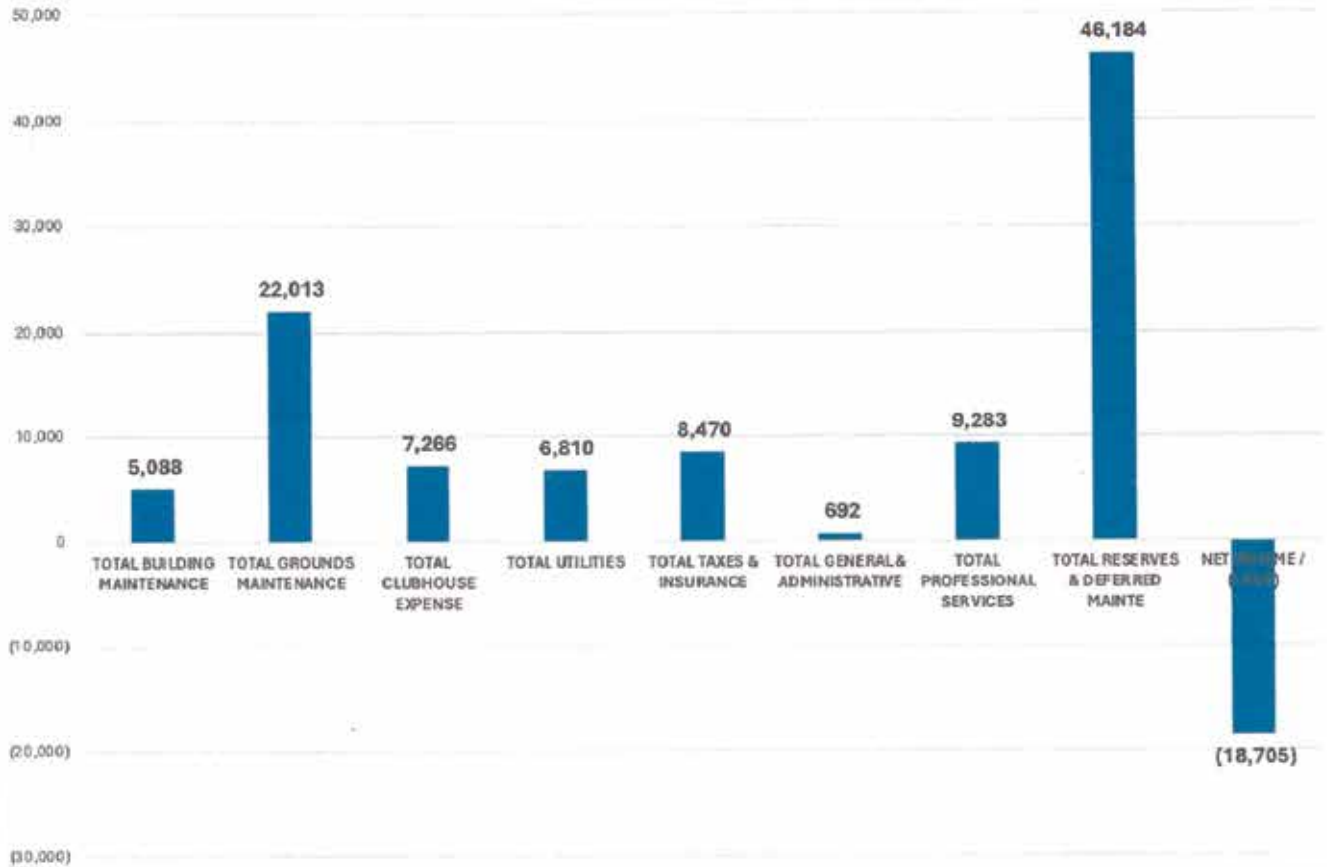

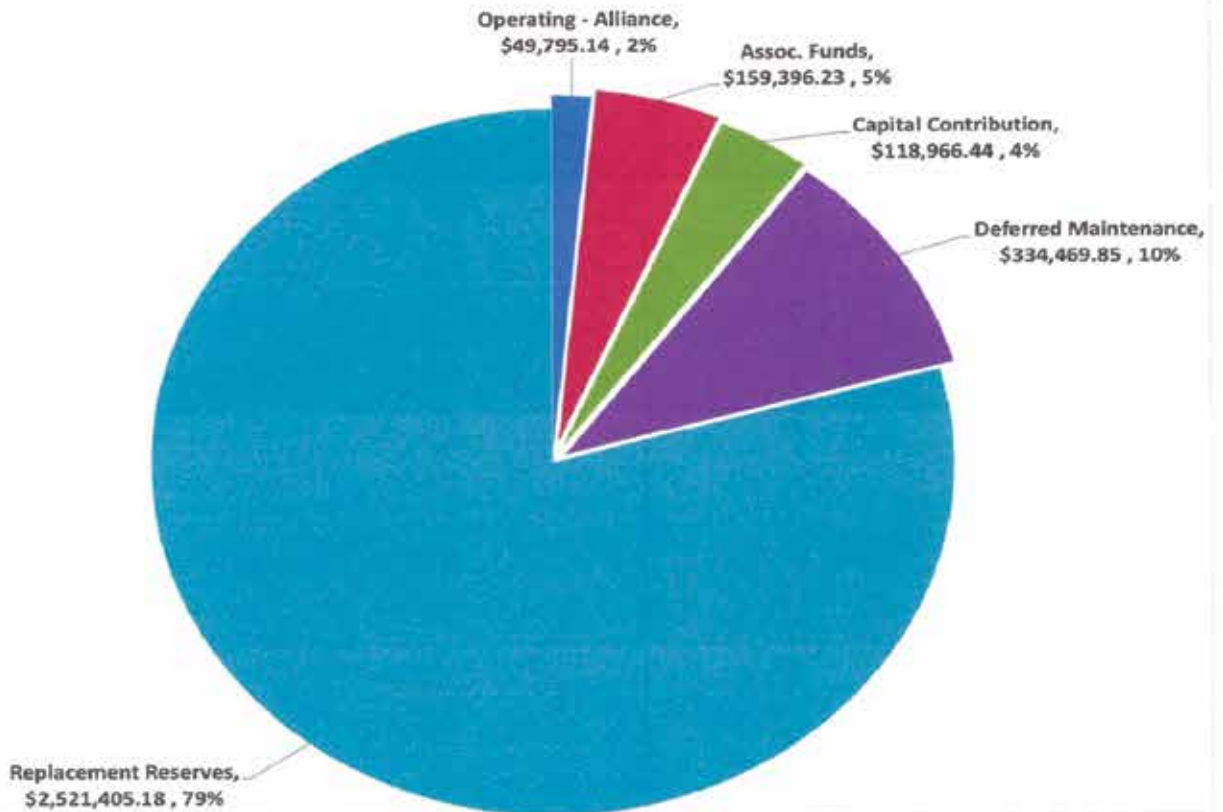

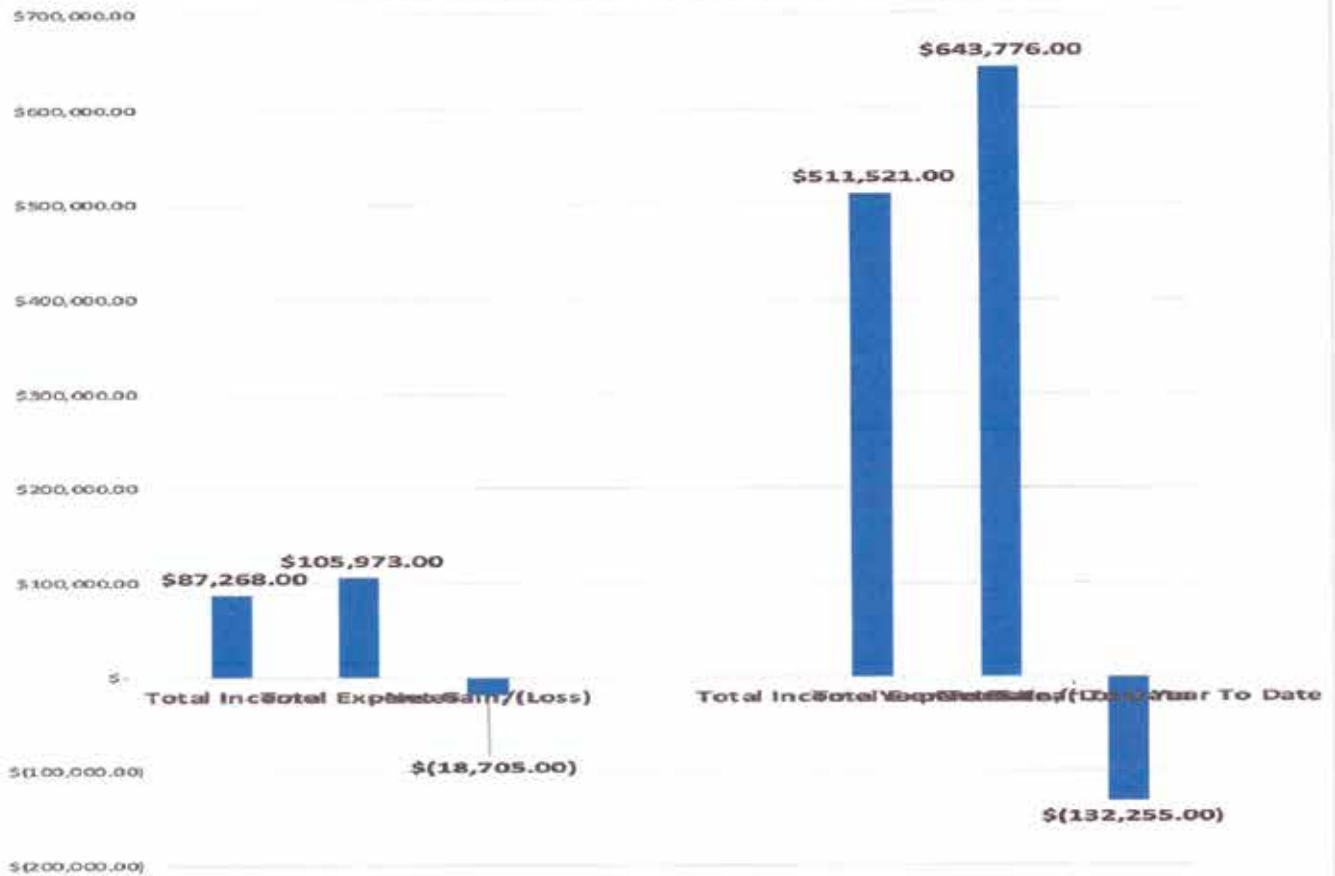
Where Did Your Money Go in June 2026



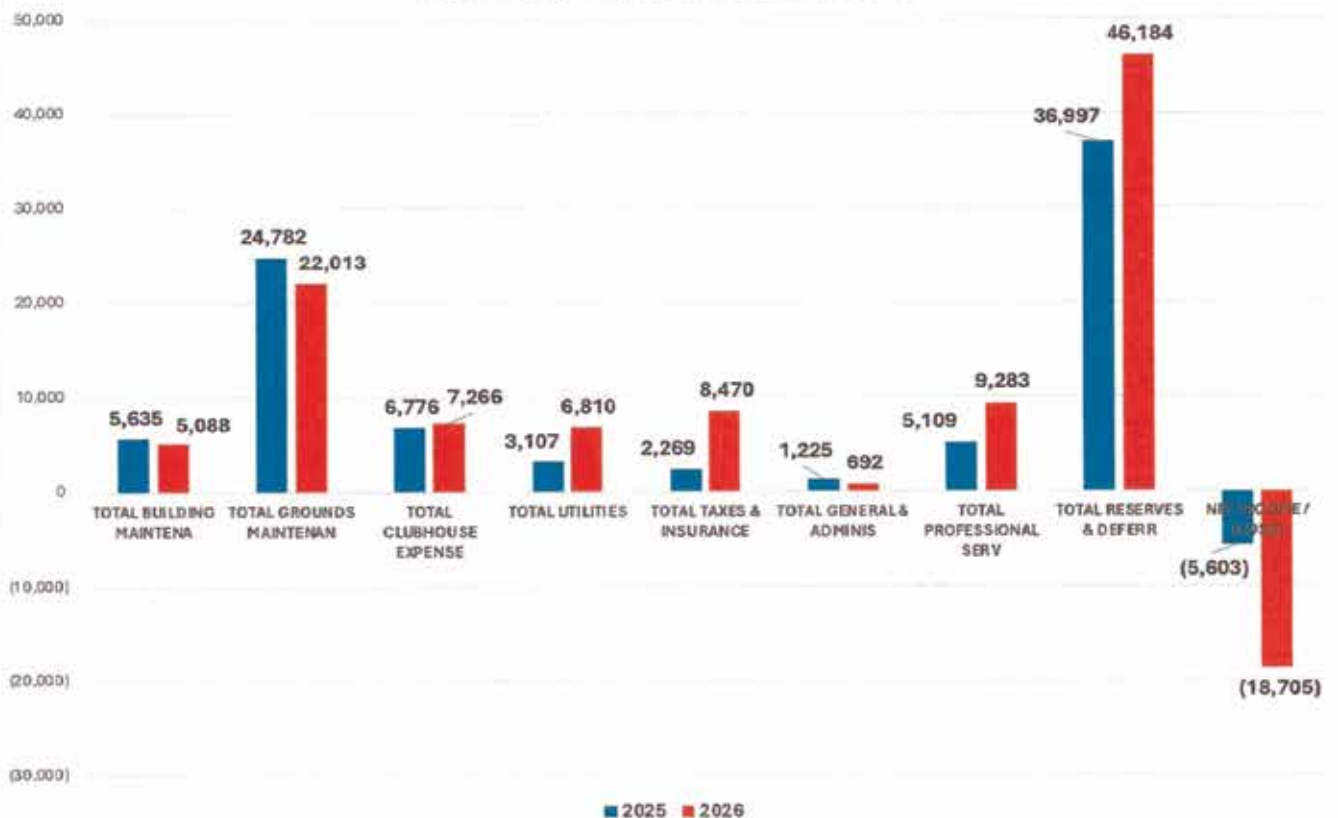
Cash Balance Summary June 2026

In attendance: Bob Schaefer, Pres.; Judi Muschal, VP; Jim Panzitta, Treasurer; Ilene Case, Trustee; Steve Marshall, Trustee; Steve Martin; Secretary & Tracey Robinson, Community Manager.

President Schaefer called the meeting to order at **2 pm** – and the Meditation and the Pledge of Allegiance were recited.

President Schaefer asked for a recommendation that the Meeting Minutes from the last meeting be accepted. Motion made by Judi Muschal seconded by Steve Marshall. Motion carried.

ARC Committee – Reported by Rosemary Panzitta

- Since the last Board Meeting 19 ARC Requests were submitted and all were accepted

Buildings & Grounds – Reported by Steve Martin

- The turf application originally scheduled for August 12th will now be done on August 18th, weather permitting. This will including liquid fertilizer 20-0-2 and ThreeWay Low Odor herbicide

- Putting Green and Bocce Court resurfacing – Cost is \$1,000; Motion to accept Judi; seconded by Steve Martin; Motion passed

New Business

- Ordering and installing new Stop signs – Cost is \$1736.62 – Motion to approve by Steve Marshall; seconded by Jim; Motion approved
- Rezkom Contract – motion to approve by Steve Marshall; seconded by Steve Martin; motion approved
- Candidate call Letter has gone out for those interested in running for the board
- Electric work for Farmhouse – cost is \$810.35. Motion to approve by Judi; seconded by Steve Marshall; motion approved
- LMS Tree work – cost is \$2900; motion to approve by Jim; seconded by Judi; motion approved

Community Input

- A resident commented on the 2 websites that display information about Locust Hill are not showing the same information, especially the calendar. Tracey will add the calendar to the Connect website.
- A question was asked about when the driveways will be done. Bob explained we are meeting with the contractor to firm up dates and the information will be coming out soon.
- A resident asked about whether fiber optic connections will be installed in Locust Hill. At this time there are no discussions on this topic.
- A resident is concerned about the herbicide that will be applied later this month and stated that it is not safe for children and pets. Bob replied that it is being applied by a licensed contractor and they are observing all the safety requirements. We will check with the contractor to make sure what, if any warnings need to be conveyed to the community.
- A question was asked about why we don't use people within the community who have special skills such as former electricians or plumbers to perform work. Tracey stated that there are insurance and license requirements for all vendors that provide services for Locust Hill.
- A question was posed to the board if there are any projected increases in the monthly HOA fee. Jim replied that the budget for next year has not been completed so that question could not be answered.
- One resident asked about the fan for the greenhouse and also the air conditioning for the farmhouse. Bob stated that the fan in the greenhouse should be on a thermostat so it should shutoff on its own. We can have that checked. Also the question on why the farmhouse air conditioning is being run when no one is using it. Bob said the farmhouse must be temperature controlled and has been set so it should not be adjusted.
- A question was asked if traffic lane arrows could be painted at the traffic light on Yardville-Hamilton Square road. They stated they have had instances where people are in the right lane and then make a left hand turn and she has to quickly make adjustments in order to avoid an accident. Bob mentioned that roads are being repaved and we will look into that after the repaving is completed.
- A few residents commented on the pool furniture and chairs and that they are showing their age and in some cases are not functioning properly and we should look into replacing them soon.
- Additionally a resident asked about replacing the tables and chairs in the clubhouse ballroom as they are getting rather old.
- A resident asked about getting the lamp posts painted.
- Comment was made on the ceiling in the clubhouse and how it should be repainted.

Meeting Adjournment

Having no further business to discuss, Bob Schaefer asked that a motion be made to adjourn the Board Meeting 2:35 pm. Motion made by Judi and seconded by Steve Martin. Motion carried.

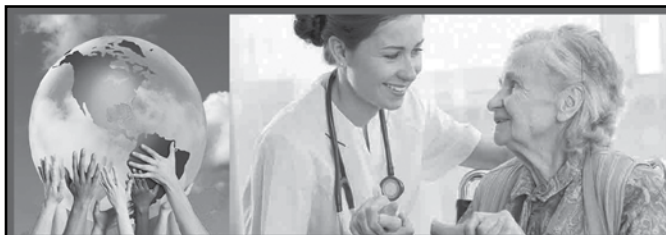

ALMOST FORGOTTEN

Life Without Air Conditioning

Are you old enough to remember life without air conditioning? Life without air conditioning is one of those times that are almost forgotten. How did people manage on those hot, summer days?

I can remember coming off the boardwalk in Atlantic City at night with my parents in the pre-air conditioning days. As we walked off the boards, we passed several small bars or clubs. Their doors were wide open to catch any breeze or fresh air and you could investigate the club from the sidewalk and watch or listen to the combo playing music. Further down the street on the corner of Atlantic Avenue was a movie theatre that had all the fire exit doors open so air would circulate. You could stand on the sidewalk and watch the movie from a bad angle, but you could not hear the dialogue. Probably, the first place to get air conditioning were bars and movie theaters to attract customers.

People utilized porches and sat outside more. Today you can see houses with big porches or

decks which are not being used because of air conditioning. I grew up without air conditioning as probably many older folks did. Our front porch, like most in the neighborhood, had a three-foot-high section which was part of the building and then about a six-foot open section to the roof. In the spring, we got the screens out from under the porch, washed them, and hooked them up to the empty section of the porch to make a shady screened-in porch. During the day it was a shady, cool place to read or play with friends. Part of our summer furniture, which came down from the attic, was a trundle bed and on hot summer nights, I slept on the porch. If it rained, we had to move the furniture back from the screens.

Due to the heat, church attendance usually dropped in the summer. I can remember in pre-air conditioning my shirt sticking to the back of a wooden pew. Churches were quick to find money for air conditioning.

PROPERTY MODIFICATIONS

Planning any exterior home improvement, such as landscaping, roofing, windows, doors, patio, or deck? Before work begins, submit a Property Modification form to the chairperson of the ARC Committee. This form is available in the clubhouse computer room or online at <https://portal.connectresident.com>. Include the name of the contractor and description of work to be performed.

Locust Hill Architectural Guidelines

These architectural guidelines are excerpted from the Locust Hill Homeowners Association Architectural Review Committee Guideline Book. <https://portal.connectresident.com>. Homeowners who are unsure whether a proposed project meets the guidelines should contact the Chairperson of the Architectural Committee. (above)

1. A Property Modification application **MUST** be submitted to the Architectural Committee prior to the start of ANY exterior modification. This includes, but is not limited to, redoing outside landscaping, installing shutters, changing windows, adding a deck or patio, generators, replacing trees in the front or side of the house.
2. Planting Beds – Only flowers and shrubs are permitted in all flowerbeds. Tomato plants, vegetables, fruit trees or fruit bushes of any kind are **NOT** permitted in any flowerbeds. Shrubs cannot exceed five (5) feet in height.
3. A maximum of ten (10) ornaments are permitted in the planting beds. Bird feeders should not exceed two (2). Objects placed within the planting beds must be ornamental **ONLY**. Planting beds may not be used for seating or patio area.
4. Backyard – Concrete, brick, block, and deck patios must be repaired if cracked or chipped and weeds kept from growing between bricks or under decks. Wooden decks must be routinely treated as prescribed by the manufacturer to prevent rotting and for termite control.
5. Decks & Patio – Your patio and deck is not to be used as a storage area for bicycles, tricycles, ladders, garden tools and utensils, empty and /or broken flowerpots, mulch, or any other household items. Acceptable items on your patio include patio furnishings, patio/deck storage container box, grill, and flowerpots that can be filled with flowers, herbs
6. Foundations/Porch – Foundations or porches may be resurfaced, painted, or stained to match the house siding color, stone front or remain the natural concrete color only.
7. Holiday Decorations – Decorations may be displayed two (2) weeks before the holiday and removed two (2) weeks after. Decorative door wreaths may be displayed seasonally year round. CHRISTMAS DECORATIONS may be displayed from Thanksgiving to January 31st, and then they **MUST** be removed.
8. Trees – Homeowners are responsible for the trees located in the front or side of their of their homes. No tree is permitted to be removed and replaced without permission from the Architectural Committee. Replacement trees must have a trunk size of 2-inch caliper or more.

I took basic training in the army during July and August at Fort Dix, and our barracks had no air conditioning. I never went to school or college with air conditioning. I never taught in a school with air-conditioned classes. Teaching on very hot days in September or June was difficult. Even when I taught summer school, there were no air-conditioned classes, but classes ended at noon.

Until we moved to Locust Hill, we never had central air conditioning or any air conditioning. Many trees helped keep our home shady and cool, and we kept windows open and used fans. Of course, when it rained there was a mad family dash to close the windows.

Some folks never experienced life without air conditioning. For some people these stories may bring back memories of life without air conditioning that have been forgotten – almost.
